




THE BASICS



- Michigan is one of the best states to homeschool in (People V. DeJonge, 1993)
- Parents have a recognized right to homeschool and are not required to report to the state (MCL 380.1561)
- Homeschooling parents may issue high school diplomas
- Homeschool parents can also start "non-public" schools



WHAT MAKES A CLASS/COURSE/ ACADEMIC CREDIT?

- To count as a single credit, traditionally, a course is an "organized academic program" with
- a set curriculum and
- > objective learning goals that serve as the basis for grading
- that includes about 300 minutes (6 "50 minute" hours) of study per week, including instruction and personal study time, and typically amounts to at least 40 hours of study throughout the course.
- Best Practice: Write a course description for each course your students participate in and retain this description with your records.

World History I

Full Year Course | Grade 9 | 1 Social Studies Credit

Course Description: In World History I, our study will begin at the biblical foundation of Creation eventually progressing as far as the High Middle Ages. From a providential (recognizing God's guiding hand) perspective, we will analyze the ideologies and presuppositions of the major world civilizations as they rise and fall. We will further trace the impact and interaction of these societies with other societies around the world and their legacy within the greater scope of history. Our studies will particularly highlight the connections between the people of the Bible and their contemporaries, thus establishing a better contextual understanding of the Word of God. As we move forward from the history of the early church, we will study the impact of the spread of the gospel in conjunction with key historical developments such as Catholic Christianity in the Age of Faith, The Byzantine Empire, Islamic Expansion, the Rise of Chinese and Indian Dynasties, and the early development of Western Europe.

The objective of this course is to allow students to ascertain a foundational and biblical knowledge of early world civilizations that provide both a chronological and philosophic context for future studies. Grading will be based on weekly work such as reading and writing assignments, class participation, special projects, tests and exams.

BEST PRACTICES FOR ELEMENTARY & MIDDLE SCHOOL

- Keep a record sheet for each Academic Discipline (sample template in folder)
- Make a Report Card (sample template in folder)
- Have your child build a "portfolio" each year of their work. This varies with age, but include writing samples, projects, art, tests, etc. Save through K-12.
- Have a family year-end celebration, presentation, or ceremony

HOW TO PREPARE YOU CHILD FOR SUCCESS:

The best parents are mentors, not coaches.

- <u>Teach</u> them to love God, know His Voice, and follow His will.
- Pray for and with your child regularly about their future life
- Ask your Child "What does God want you to do?" "What do you see as your gifts and interests?" "What is God's plan for your life?"
- Guide them in taking action to prepare



Remember that you are training your child for their future station in life (to be a responsible husband, wife, parent, citizen, and employee or business owner). You are training them to become a good adult. You are not training them to be a good child.




